

This Sunday's readings encourage us to turn towards growth and transformation out of pain and suffering. The prophet Jeremiah in the First Reading makes a great proclamation: 'See, the days are coming . . when I will make a new covenant with the House of Israel'. God's eternal covenant of love and forgiveness is written deep within our

It is because of this same promise in the Second Reading, that Christ became human to share with us in our suffering, forever praying for us and with us. In Christ, all suffering and death are transfigured into growth and new life through his resurrection.

In the Gospel, Jesus speaks of the personal suffering and death that he will soon be facing. He knows that he could ask his Father to save him from this fate, but instead he willingly makes a choice that leads to our salvation. Jesus invites us to follow his way of living. POPE: SAINTS NOT EXCEPTIONS, BUT EXAMPLES OF HUMANITY'S VIRTUE

The saints are not unreachable "exceptions of humanity" but ordinary people who worked diligently to grow in virtue, Pope

in St. Peter's Square.

It is wrong to think of the saints as "a kind of small circle of champions who live beyond the limits of our species", instead, they are "those who fully become themselves, who realise the vocation of every person."

"How happy would be a world in which justice, respect, mutual respect, the breadth of the spirit (and) hope were the shared norm and not a rare anomaly," he wrote.

Just like at his general audience on March 6, Pope Francis told visitors in the square that due to a mild cold an aide, Msgr Pierluigi Giroli, would read his speech.

Continuing his series of catechesis on virtues and vices, the Pope wrote that a virtuous person is not one who allows themself to become distorted but "is faithful to his Cardinal Gugerotti said Pope Francis "intends to carry out or her own vocation and fully realises his or herself."

GLOBAL LIFE EXPECTANCY FELL DURING COVID - BUT NOT IN AUSTRALIA

Global life expectancy fell by 1.6 years during the first two years of the COVID-19 pandemic, but Australia was one of the few countries where

people were still expected to live longer.

A new study published on Tuesday in medical journal The Lancet provides the most comprehensive look at the pandemic's toll on human health so far. It found almost every country experienced sharp dips in life expectancy in 2020 and 2021, reversing the long-standing trend of people living longer.

Australia and New Zealand were among only 32 countries and territories, out of 204 studied, to record an increase in life expectancy across the first two years of the pandemic. Full report at www.cathnews.com

VATICAN'S GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTION TO AID **HUMANITARIAN EFFORTS IN**

This year, the Vatican's annual Good Friday financial appeal for the Holy Land highlights the urgent

Francis said during his general audience on Wednesday humanitarian crisis facing the beleaguered population in Gaza and the Pope's pleă for peace.

"The outbreak of the war in Gaza, after the events of October 7, paralysed the Holy Land. The lack of pilgrims and tourists has put thousands of families in difficulty." Cardinal Claudio Gugerotti, prefect of the Dicastery for the Eastern Churches, said in a letter released on March 8.

The Vatican has overseen the Pro Terra Sancta fund, or the Pontifical Collection for the Holy Land, since 1974, when Pope Paul VI designated Good Friday as the day for the collection to be taken up by parishes around the world. This year's appeal comes against the backdrop of the ongoing Israel-Hamas war, which has had a devastating effect on the civilian population.
