Trust in the Lord is the theme that links all this week's readings. As we continue our Lenten journey, we are reminded of the extent of the Lord's love and generosity – if we but listen to his voice and place our trust in him.

In the First Reading we see the depth of Abraham's trust in God as he is asked to sacrifice his beloved son. Abraham's faithfulness is rewarded with more blessings than he could ever have imagined.

In the echoing the story of Abraham and Isaac, St Paul in the Second Reading challenges us to recall the immensity of God's love for the world in giving up his Son. With Jesus standing at the right hand of God pleading for us, we can have confidence in placing all our trust in him. In the Gospel, Jesus asks Peter, James and John to trust him, without speaking of the wonder they have witnessed on the mountain top.

CLOSING THE GAP REPORT IS A WAKE-UP CALL

Australian Catholics are being encouraged to reflect upon the implications of the latest report on Aboriginal and Torres Strait

Islander wellbeing, with calls for the report to be the starting point for renewed action.

The latest report has found that improvement will continue to fail without fundamental changes, adding that successive governments have 'failed to fully grasp' the challenges. It calls for urgent changes to rescue the landmark agreement, accusing the federal government of 'weak' action on key areas, not fulfilling its promises and a 'disregard' for the suggestions of First Nations communities.

In response to the report, Bishop Charles Gauci - chair of the Australian Catholic Bishops Commission for Relations with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders - emphasised the pressing need for Australian Catholics to collaborate with their First Nations counterparts to achieve tangible improvements in their lives.

'As a Church, we are called to illuminate and enrich Australian society, particularly in the realm of Indigenous affairs,' Bishop Gauci said. 'Now more than ever, we must unite, deliberate and take meaningful action.' He underscored the importance of Catholic institutions in fostering holistic wellbeing for all First Nations people. POPE APPEALS FOR PEACE IN **SUDAN AND MOZAMBIQUE**

Pope Francis has urged global leaders to push for peace in Sudan and northern Mozambique, where a Catholic mission of Our Lady of

Africa in Mazeze was set ablaze.

"Wherever fighting occurs, people are exhausted, tired of effort to get along with everyone they live with. war, which as always is pointless and inconclusive, and Progress on the Lenten "path of conversion and renewal," will only bring death, only destruction, and will never solve the problem."

Pope Francis launched that appeal on Sunday after praying the Angelus prayer with pilgrims in St Peter's Square. He recalled that 10 months have passed since conflict broke out in Sudan, leading to a serious humanitarian situation.

"I once again ask the warring parties to stop this war, which causes so much harm to the people and the future of the country," he said. "Let us pray that paths to peace Lent, the Pope said, also is a time to rediscover "with joy are soon found to build the future of dear Sudan." 'IN FAITH, YOU ARE NOT ALONE'

The Rite of Election was held in cathedrals across Australia on the first Sunday of Lent, an important step for those participating in the Rite of Christian Initiation and preparing to be

received into the Catholic Church at Easter.

The Rite of Election has roots in traditions held since the early centuries of the Church but has existed in its current form since the promulgation of the RCIA in 1972.

In Melbourne, almost 1000 people - catechumens, candidates, sponsors, godparents, fellow parishioners and families, gathered at St Patrick's Cathedral for the Rite.

"Just have a look around you," Melbourne Archbishop Peter A Comensoli told the catechumens and candidates \\ from more than 60 parishes from across the archdiocese. "You are not alone. In faith, you are not alone."

At St Mary's Cathedral in Sydney, 266 people intending to enter the Catholic Church were presented.

Each parish's representatives processed down the cathedral's aisle to present Sydney Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP with a "Book of the Elect," upon which is written the names of the catechumens seeking baptism.

In Brisbane, this year marked the biggest number – 128 of catechumens up for election. Catechumens are people who will be baptised at Easter. There were also 70 candidates (people who were baptised in other Christian traditions) who will be confirmed Catholics at Easter.
